Year in Review: As the author of several popular labor law manuals, Richard J. Simmons edited the books this year to reflect a myriad of recent changes in employment law including amendments to the Americans With Disabilities Act and passage of the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act, which makes it easier to sue for gender discrimination. Wage-and-hour class actions have also kept Simmons' litigation practice hopping. His most recent victory was on behalf of restaurant chain Chipotle. He also successfully defended Long Beach Memorial Medical Center in a class action case involving overtime and employee scheduling flexibility

Next Challenge: ISimmons plans to write a friend-of-the-court brief in an important wage-and-hour case pending at the California Supreme Court, Brinker Restaurant v.

Superior Court of San Diego. The 2nd District Court of Appeal cited his "Wage and Hour Manual for California Employers" in its decision, which said companies aren't required to make sure employees are taking meal and rest breaks.
